SPEAKERS



Steven P. Roose, MD is Professor of Clinical Psychiatry at the College of Physicians and Surgeons, Columbia University and Director of the Neuropsychiatry Research Clinic at the NY State Psychiatric Institute. Dr. Roose graduated from the Mount Sinai School of Medicine and completed his psychiatric residency at Columbia Presbyterian/ NY State Psychiatric Institute and a NIMH-sponsored research fellowship in affective disorders. His research focuses on the phenomenology,

psychobiology and treatment of affective disorders with a specific concentration on the relationship between cardiovascular disease and depression and on the treatment of late-life depression.



Andrew J. Gerber, MD, PhD is Assistant Professor of Clinical Psychiatry at Columbia Medical Center and the NY State Psychiatric Institute. Dr. Gerber completed his medical and psychiatric training at Harvard Medical School and Weill Cornell Medical College, where he served as chief resident. His child psychiatry training was at the combined Columbia-Cornell NY Presbyterian Hospital program, where he was also chief resident. He then completed a PhD in psychology at University

College London. Dr. Gerber's research interests include the neurobiological bases of the development of mental illness in children and adolescents and how the brain changes in response to psychotherapy and medication.



Jennifer L. Payne, MD, PhD is Assistant Professor of Psychiatry at the Johns Hopkins School of Medicine and the founder and Director of the Women's Mood Disorders Center at Johns Hopkins. Dr. Payne received her medical degree from Washington U. Medical School and completed her residency in psychiatry at the Johns Hopkins Hospital where she served as chief resident during her last year. She then completed a fellowship in mood disorders through the NIMH Mood and

Anxiety Disorders Program. Dr. Payne conducts research into the genetic, biological and environmental factors involved in reproductive-associated mood disorders and also directs the Mood Disorders Clinical Trials group with the goal of developing novel treatments for depression and bipolar disorder.



Warren D. Taylor, MD, MHS is Associate Professor of Psychiatry at Duke University Medical Center. After receiving his medical degree from the University of South Florida, he completed his residency and fellowship in Geriatric Psychiatry at Duke University Medical Center, where he joined the faculty in 2001. He serves as Vice-Chair of the Duke Institutional Review Board, guiding the ethical and regulatory review of human participant research at Duke. Dr. Taylor studies depression across

the adult lifespan, with a particular emphasis on neuroimaging and how genetic differences contribute to developing depression and may influence individual response to current antidepressant treatments.





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
